



Mr. Carl Leroy Wilder

Mr. Carl Leroy Wilder, 76, of Albany, died on Tuesday, June 23, 2020 at the Lillian Carter Health and Rehabilitation in Plains, GA., after a lengthy battle with Alzheimer's.

The funeral service will be held at 10:00 AM on Friday, June 26, 2020 at the First Baptist Church of Acree, interment will follow in the Hillcrest Cemetery. The Rev. Tim Bass will officiate.

Mr. Wilder was born on December 12, 1943 in Albany, GA., to the late C.L. Wilder Jr., and Reba Mae Branch Wilder. “ My name is Larry Watson, and I lived in Acree for about a year in the early '50s, and went to school at Broad Street Elementary in Albany. I still remember Carl and his father Roy. At 76 the memories are not as vivid as they once were, but I can still recall Carl and myself hanging out together with a few other kids, one or two of them named Hancock, whose father ran the little store in town. I recall one of the boys had a sled and a horse, probably Carl, and that horse pulled us and that sled all over town! I remember the daily newspaper being dropped from a small plane every afternoon in a field up near the highway, and another lad, also named Hancock, retrieving the bag and delivering the papers. I think he was a cousin of the others. I can also still see in my mind's eye Carl's father, Roy, riding into town now and then on a horse that could do tricks. When he would arrive people would gather around and Roy would make the horse perform.

I have often wondered where Carl was and what he was doing, and once or twice tried unsuccessfully to contact him. I am saddened to hear he is now gone. Please accept my condolences.
